Bucks Potter Adam gave us a fascinating account of his working life and his ceramic endeavours, using a slideshow to take us through his development. He encouraged questions and interaction from the members which made for a fun and lively evening.

Adam has been working with clay on and off since he was a young child. He nearly specialised in ceramics while on a foundation course at Wimbledon College of Arts but was so fascinated by the potential of the nascent internet that he decided on a career as a computer programmer and technology consultant. He won many awards along the way, culminating in two Baftas for Interactive Videos. To our surprise Adam brought and displayed one of these Baftas in the meeting (top, centre). He played us these Bafta winning videos which were ground breaking at the time and are still great to watch now.

He has recently returned his attention back to ceramics and has been combining technology and clay into a series of reactive-sensitive lamps, some of which he brought along (bottom left and centre). He uses Potclays white stoneware.

Adam enjoys experimenting with different firing techniques for the lamps including Raku, Obvara and Saggar firings. He has also been involved with the Oxford Anagama Kiln Project.

He has always enjoyed throwing on the wheel and he demonstrated 'ventilating' one of his bowls which is what he specialises in, as he explained: basically he loves putting holes in ceramics! (top right). His method involves drawing lines using a compass and he cuts holes where the circles overlap. For this he uses Bath Potters' brass hole cutting tools.













Lately Adam has been making coasters from the left over circles. While he was doing his hole cuttting demo he asked members of the audience to have a go at throwing on the pedal powered wheel which he had brought along. This looked very difficult but several throwers had a go, including Max (bottom right).

Adam lives at Town Farm, Princes Risborough where he has a large studio. He has a list of things he would like to try:

- Mastering thrown porcelain
- Double walled and lidded forms
- Moulds and slip casting
- 3D clay printing

We'd love to see the results of these experiments in the next installment. Thanks Adam for a really enjoyable evening.

28 February WORKSHOP

RICHARD BALLANTYNE & CAROL READ Bird Making Workshop

Due to illness of the booked speaker, Richard Ballantyne and Carol Read stepped in once again to save the night, turning the evening into a workshop. At very short notice, they brought in ready thrown 'bodies' and then we all set about making birds with their help and guidance. They also brought in reference books to remind us what various birds look like which was a great help! They displayed some of their mounted finished pieces for inspiration.

Richard used Scarva Ashraf Hanna clay. It is expensive but worth every penny he says. It has enough grog to make it very stable yet malleable. It's particularly good for some delicate details e.g. wing feathers. The thrown bodies were initially bashed into different bird shapes using a paddle. Richard

















took us through the various stages, making it look easy! There were so many lovely and varied birds produced. Fortunately the attendance was very good and it was a creative and enjoyable evening. I saw an unfamiliar face and found out later that he was a non-potter – a man from the village who decided to pop in and take part. He produced a lovely owl. (see 3rd from left, central row). Hopefully he'll spread the word around the village! Great fun and diversity. Thank you Richard and Carol for a wonderful workshop.
